Dear Sir.

I am still of the opinion that the suit against the three, Barlow and others, had better be dropped, and suits against the several N.Y. papers and that is much of the suits, the entire Vigilance Core matter be joined with the publishers of in each of the suits. That the damages in each suit should be read as high as \$100,000; that all the suits should be commenced at the same time;

and all pushed to trial as soon as may be, which the whole matter is fresh in the public mind.

My reasons for these opinions I will give in detail hereafter at an interview, or an paper, as may be needed.

I think we ought to have an interview with - to save time I send him a copy of this - Mr. Sedgwick soon as may be. Please give me as early notice as possible of the time and place of the interview.
